

The European Union, along with its bank, the European Investment Bank, is collaborating with Ukrainian authorities and UNDP on three recovery programmes focused on rebuilding critical social infrastructure to meet essential needs and ensure decent living conditions for displaced people and their host communities:



Support has been in place since 2015, initially focused on addressing needs in the eastern part of Ukraine, which was affected by the armed conflict that began in 2014. However, with the onset of the full-scale Russian invasion in 2022, the importance of this support has grown significantly. Through the recovery programmes, Ukrainian communities can access the financial resources needed to restore and upgrade essential social infrastructure, including war-damaged or outdated facilities such as schools, kindergartens, hospitals, housing, and water systems.

Ministry for Development of Communities and Territories of Ukraine coordinates these programmes together with the Ukraine's Ministry of Finance, while the reconstruction subprojects are fully managed by local communities. UNDP provides technical assistance, ensuring the effective and efficient implementation of subprojects.

# **UKRAINE RECOVERY PROGRAMME III**

- → Budget **€100 million**
- → Launched in July 2024

In July 2024, €100 million programme was signed with the government to further support the restoration of essential services. As with previous programmes, EIB provides long-term funding and expertise. Ukrainian cities can apply for subventions to rebuild healthcare, housing, education and water facilities, with priority given to liberated areas, areas close to conflict zones and regions with large numbers of internally displaced people. An additional €150 million has also been approved by the EIB and could be implemented rapidly upon Ukraine's request.



# THE TOLL OF WAR



Since the start of the full-scale Russian invasion in 2022, more than **89** facilities previously reconstructed under the programmes have been damaged or destroyed, particularly in areas that were occupied or heavily shelled.

## FINANCING AND IMPLEMENTING PARTNERS



The three recovery programmes, totaling €640 million, are framework loans provided to the government of Ukraine by the **European Investment Bank (EIB)**, the financial arm of the European Union.



These loans are complemented by up €15 million in EU grants to support programme implementation.



The United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) in Ukraine provides technical assistance to Ukrainian communities in implementing recovery subprojects on the ground along with independent comprehensive monitoring during the subproject cycle.



Ministry for Development of Communities and Territories of Ukraine, together with the Ministry of Finance, coordinates and oversees the implementation of the programmes, while local governments in participating cities are responsible for fully managing the reconstruction subprojects.

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
